

Pastor's Report

Dear Friends of New Hanover Evangelical Lutheran Church:

This past year, 2021, may be one of the most pivotal years in our 321-year history. Though this past year has been unusual and difficult, it has been a year where we have profoundly experienced God's faithfulness to us as a community. There are numerous things for which we can be grateful.

First, we have begun to see new eagerness and new initiatives as well as sustainability in our current ministries. Energizing our youth and family ministries, we created a new position, Director of Children, Youth and Family Ministries. Nicole Young is focused on spiritually feeding and creating opportunities for mission for individuals and families. Deacon Carol Detweiler has transferred her talents to become our Director of Senior Faith Formation, and Patricia Nyce has come onboard as our Director of Music Ministry. Each position focused on utilizing our vast collection of talents to grow in faith and worship.

Second, we through many volunteers and staff giftedness enabled us to transition smoothly in online and in-person services and events. We have sustained our community by connecting with one another through the digital world. With a new website platform, increased Wi-Fi and rented video capability we connected our worship and events to more people in recent history. It is our plan in 2022 to install new technology in both sound and video that will increase our capabilities.

Third, we are grateful that we increased our commitment to "Loving Our Neighbors, by Healing and Feeding Them." The Garden of Hope was planted this past Spring. 3,000 sq. feet of God's Creation that produced close to 5,000 pounds and over 20,000 meals, in addition to the 70,000 meals delivered by the Loaves and Fishes food ministry! All through the sweat and dedication of the team of volunteers who make this dream work.

Another important event in the fall was our "Thriving Beyond Covid Dreamer Weekend Retreat." Armed with the scripture, "Now to God who by the power at work within us is able to accomplish abundantly far more than all we can ask or imagine (Ephesians 3: 2)", Council along with dreamers and St. Luke ELC, set forth to create our opportunities and dreams for the coming year and beyond. Key dreams were to fully utilize our property and facilities for the greater good of our community and raise revenues, in addition to expanding our focus of ministries to serve the community outside our walls.

Key obstacles and fears were also defined in our retreat. Key among them were financial stability, lack of discipleship and prayer. Financial stability keeping up with ministry growth is a growing concern; however, our leadership is focusing on new initiatives in grants, generosity and investments to overcome those concerns. Making discipleship a strength is crucial and your prayers are coveted to that end. We are growing ministries and helping our neighbors at a pace not seen in recent history, and our neighbors need it. Each of us have spiritual gifts that can be utilized in helping sustain and grow these essential ministries (Use your Spirit Card).

Therefore, a church committed to using and ministering the powerful love of Jesus is more important than ever. Considering your perseverance, resilience, and Christlikeness this past year, we are confident that by God's grace NHELC will be the healing and feeding community that God longs for us to be and that our neighbor needs.

As I do each year, I want to thank everyone who has and is faithfully serving in our ministries and worship services. Your participation in online and in-person services and events, your connecting with one another through the digital world and inperson, your encouragement of the staff and your generous financial support were critical to our fin-

ishing the year strong and beginning the new year with hope.

And I encourage you to ask God what God is calling you to do next as we work together to offer the hope and joy of the Good News to our friends, neighbors and coworkers in the small piece of creation, God so named, New Hanover and beyond. Peace my friends.

Director of Children, Family & Youth Ministry Report

It has been a whirlwind of a few months for me here at NHELC. I began my new position in August. My first day corresponded with the Christian Education meeting so I got to start my first day and run my first committee meeting all at once. I spent the month of August gearing up to come back. This of course was not a normal back to Sunday School, but rather coming back for the first time since Covid shut things down. We worked out a new Sunday School Schedule, selected cur-

riculum and geared up to have catechism back in person. We had a Flutter pool party in August that allowed me to start to get to know the youth and had the youth come out to pick potatoes from the garden one night – we bribed them with pizza and root beer floats. After the pizza and before the root beer floats those kids and some of their families made quick work of those potatoes!

We started the month of September with a teacher breakfast on Saturday, September 11th, followed

by Sunday School Kick-Off on September 12th. On rally day we had over 60 people at the kickoff. We made kindness bags and had a scavenger hunt and the students got to visit their rooms and teachers. The catechism group met briefly to discuss expectations and how everything would work this year. We also handed out 9 Bibles on Sunday School Kick-off day to 9 third graders. At the end of September we had a painting event and we had 27 people out in the grove to paint a fall scene and raised \$405 for the Amazing Raise. Flutter also utilized the grove at the end of September and played outdoor games and made service bags for the Boyertown Multi-Service.

October was a very full month. We began the month with the Harvesting Hope Fair which was fantastic. Our kids came and enjoyed the event. We had youth that helped out with games and the bake sale. It was a perfect day and everyone enjoyed themselves. We also had First Communion classes in October which culminated in 10 students celebrating their first Communion on October 31st. We had our first Generations in Faith Together (G.I.F.T.) Sunday and had a reception for those that celebrated their first communion as well as some reformation themed activities. Flutter had planned a spooky fall activity that unfortunately got rained out. I was also able to take some time to do some training on best practices in Family ministry.

November was a quieter month that involved some planning for Advent. We had a G.I.F.T. Sunday

centered around Thankfulness. I was able to teach God and Me and God and Family to some of our scouts.

In December we had a wonderful Advent party that had over 40 people representing 14 different families. Jean Moser did a wonderful job planning a lot of fun crafts and activities for the children and their families and we thank all of those that helped at the stations! On G.I.F.T. Sunday we had a Christmas Pageant, and the children did a fantastic job! We also got to sing some Christmas hymns during the pageant as well. The catechism class met and baked cookies to go along with the Loaves and Fishes food ministry deliveries. We also had another student that was not able to attend in October complete her first communion class and receive her first communion!

Overall, I am thrilled to be here at NHELC and I have enjoyed these first few months. I look forward to what 2022 will bring for these ministries and the church as a whole. There are lots of exciting things coming! I am so thankful for the Christian Education Board, all the Sunday School teachers and youth leaders and everyone else that has helped me these first months. Deacon's Report

2021 was a year of change for many of us. The pandemic never quite let us out of it's grip and so we kept adapting, making changes with what was normal in our lives. For me it wasn't only covid that shifted things - 2021 was also the year that shifted my professional life. March 17, 2021 marked my 24th anniversary of serving NHELC as

Director of Christian Education. December 2021 brought my 43rd year as a rostered leader in the national church serving in the field of education. And it was in this past year that change was called for. It was time for someone younger to take over ministries to children and youth and their families. So on July 1 I left behind 43 years of working with

the spiritual education of all ages and turned towards a new "life", a new ministry in which I would offer faith formation to the senior population of our congregation. It was a bittersweet moment, but our younger generations are in the capable, creative hands of Nikki Young and I am getting to work with such wonderful folks who truly are my spiritual mentors in so many ways. I have been blessed with this new faith journey!

Looking back over this past year it was divided into several parts: the DCE part, the transition period and the Director of Senior Faith Formation part. Let me share a little about what I did during those times....

From January until the end of June most of my time was spent coming up with ways to keep faith formation going in our families' homes as we continued covid shutdowns. This meant coming up with weekly faith resources which Scott Geiser so capably posted on our website's Faith Formation page. In addition to that we held a couple of special "drive-bys" when families could pick up bags of lesson ideas and supplies. We did one for Valentine's Day which included materials for the beginning of Lent as well. Another was held on Palm Sunday with resources for Holy Week and Easter. Then we actually came together, outdoors, in May to celebrate Earth Day with an intergenerational event with a variety of activities. Last but not least, planning for VBS had begun with the first sessions being held the end of June. As in the previous year I worked with leaders from our sister congregations, which again was such a wonderful experience. This time we even added an Adult VBS class which I co-taught with Pastor Kay Braun.

Transitioning from DCE to my new position began. This meant working with the Christian Education Board to help them get ready for the change and to begin to plan how CE ministries would be carried out until someone began as Director of Children and Youth. I contacted previous teachers and our Sunday school families to start feeling out how they would feel about in-person learning if that would happen in the fall.

July 1 was my starting date in my new position, but much of that month was spent still transitioning. I still had to finish out overseeing VBS which ran through part of the month. I also needed to pack up many years of stuff so the new person could move into the office. Talk about a walk down memory lane, going through so many things! All of that, plus other loose ends needing to be tied up made July a very busy month. But August came, along with Nikki joining the staff and it was time to look towards the fall. I quickly became busy recruiting a new planning team, figuring out a budget for this new ministry and starting to get the word out, including developing a Seniors Survey. I set up a Seniors Ministry Table on Rally Day and chatted with folks that day about ideas. My new planning team helped organize a great Seniors Kick-Off luncheon held later in September. I continued the ministry of teaching the Thursday morning class. It was so very wonderful to finally come together after a year and a half! Next up was a first big project for Seniors and that was being a part of the Amazing Raise project and holding a first ever "Living History Cemetery Tour" to raise funds for cemetery restoration. Amanda Schlick and Brenda Hunsberger were key figures in this event - they were amazing! We ended up with an intergenerational cast and volunteer crew who all helped to make the event a big success. We're already talking about plans for next year! Soon after. Christmas was around the corner and we held a fun Seniors Christmas luncheon. Added to all of these events there were other pieces of Senior Faith Formation happening. Started by Vicki Mutter who was soon joined by Jean Moser and Jo Anne Wirt, a ministry to deliver fun bags to our seniors was well along the way. These three "gift bag angels" deliver about 40 or so bags on a regular basis. These ladies have been key to keeping our older generations linked to the church throughout the isolating times we have been having. I can't express how grateful I am for what they do. And as we move into the new year we want to expand into "Seniors Helping Others" where our older members can help with projects that benefit others. That is something a number of them noted as important to do on the returned surveys, so we want to honor that desire to serve.

As we've moved through the past year another important piece of my ministry which I still am doing is working with our prayer chain. This was begun early on in the pandemic as a new role I gave to

members of my Thursday class who obviously couldn't meet at that time. As of this writing we have had requests to pray for over 122 people. That's a lot of praying! I am so grateful to Lucille Powell who is my contact and the one who calls our prayer ladies to get the prayers going. We are just grateful that folks, members and nonmembers, entrust us with their spiritual needs. I also have continued to distribute prayer shawls as needed. From the feedback I receive each and every shawl has been greatly appreciated. Last but not least, I have kept in contact with Phoenixville Breast Care Center and see that they are kept supplied with the pillows we make - thanks to all the willing hands that put them together!

Other ministries I had the joy of being part of during the past year was attending an online Women's Retreat for five weeks, hosted by the Deacon at Trinity, Lansdale. I also was asked to preside at the graveside funeral for Doris Renninger, which was a great privilege. On July 4th I did a blessing out in the cemetery following worship to remember those buried there who had served in the Revolutionary War. Last but not least I have continued to help serve at funeral luncheons held this past fall.

I am still adjusting to my new role. It's tough going from a 32-hour work week to eight hours a week and doing all you want to do! I'm still learn-

ing how to do that. But I'm blessed to be ministering with our seniors. I also want to thank the Christian Education Board that I was so honored to work with for the last 24 years. What a team. I couldn't have done it without them. Thank you each and every one of you. And to the teachers that served so faithfully. I was blessed to work with all of you. You all made my ministry possible.

I began this report with the quote by the poet Emily Dickinson who uses the image of a bird to describe the idea of hope in our hearts. This past year has begged for hope as we all have struggled with so many on-going stresses in our daily lives. Dickinson though, wisely sees that hope never quite goes away. And I saw that over and over again in the life of NHELC this past year. Hope kept singing that little tune, sometimes so quietly, but it was there. Not only in our Faith Formation endeavors, but in all of our ministries. I heard the melody of that tune as I began my new way of serving you - it was "sung" by those who said "ves" when asked to be a part of this new venture. And those notes of hope will be heard as together we walk into 2022.

Handbell Choir Director's Report

The year 2021 began the way the year 2020 ended – Covid-19 pandemic, closed churches, businesses and schools, and pre-recorded worship services.

During the closure, the Handbell Choir was permitted to practice if all precautions established by the CDC and New Hanover's COVID team were followed. Consequently, the choir of eleven ringers was divided into two ensembles of six - seven ringers. This allowed for the required physical distancing and each ensemble practiced on a different day and time. From January through May, ensembles pre-recorded musical selections which provided special music for ten weeks of services. Handbell solos by Barbara Eisenhart, accompanied by

Steven Eisenhart, were recorded and inserted into the Maundy Thursday and Good Friday services.

In September, the Handbell Choir was permitted to once again practice as one group. Unlike many churches who experienced a decline in church attendance and participation in activities during the pandemic, the Handbell Choir at New Hanover Lutheran experienced growth! By the end of 2021, there were 13 ringers in the choir. With the current tables already filled with bells and ringers, another table configuration and additional handbells were needed. Memorial Fund contributions given in memory of Megan Weaver were used to purchase bells in the lower fourth and fifth oc-

taves. Thrivent Action Dollars provided the means to purchase two handbell tables, pads, and covers.

During the fall months, the Handbell Choir played at three Sunday services. On Christmas Eve, the choir presented a twenty-five-minute prelude for the 4:00 and 7:00 PM services.

The Handbell Choir activated its "music on the move" ministry in 2021. On Christ the King Sunday, after playing at New Hanover's 9:00 AM service, the group travelled to Emmanuel Lutheran Church, Pottstown, and played two selections during their 10:45 AM service. It is our hope that in 2022 the Choir will again be permitted to present programs for residents at area senior living facilities.

I would like to thank each of the following persons for their flexibility and dedication during this second year of challenge and learning new ways to "make it work." Each one brings a spirit of joy and enthusiasm to the Handbell Choir. We have a lot of fun making music together! A big thank you is extended to Vicki Dotterer, Lynn Fegley, Ben Fowler, LuAnne Fowler, Wayne Fowler, Marlene Hansley, Brenda Hunsberger, Donna Kehs, Jean Moser, Barbara Noecker, Carolyn Springer, Marsha Staub, and this fall we welcomed Jayne McHugh. Special thanks are extended to: Faye Weidner who filled in as a supply ringer; Brian Tracey and Steven Eisenhart, piano accompanists; Nick Trowbridge, viola accompanist; Lauren Flack, violin accompanist; and Amanda Dodge who played percussion during the Christmas Eve preludes.

The Handbell Choir looks forward to 2022 and ringing praise to our God.

Loaves & Fishes Food Ministry Report

2021 was a very busy year for the Food Ministry. We continued with our normal Wednesday and Sunday delivery schedule. We delivered on average 700 to 800 meals a week for a total of over 43,000 meals for the year. The ministry was also involved in a multitude of other activities throughout the year. The largest of these being the Garden of Hope. It was so great to see fresh organic vegetables go from farm to table and be involved in the process. Plans are already underway for this year's garden. We also supported the Picnic Grove Committee with the Great Swamp Picnic, Roast Beef Dinner, Soup Sale and Spaghetti Super. Other events that the ministry participated in were Camp Falckner, Harvesting Hope Fair and Dreamers Retreat and Boyertown Oktoberfest. As the new year begins, we are looking forward to the coming year and upcoming events. As of the new year, we started suppling a once a month meal to the Chosen 300 Ministry in Pottstown and continuously look for other opportunities to help those in a food deficit. This ministry has only been possible due to the generous donations by so many people.

We are also fortunate to have a great group of volunteers who keep this mission going.

Garden of Hope Ministry Report

God commands us to love our neighbor. With God's blessing, a dream to feed our neighbor, which started during the Covid pandemic with our food ministry program, grew into the Garden of Hope. It began during the summer of 2020, David Ryle from Trellis for Tomorrow came to Camp Falckner to talk to our youth about food sustainability. Then seeds were planted with the idea that we could use our open space to plant a garden which would grow organic produce to support our food ministry.

At the start of 2021, a group of interested congregation members met via Zoom to discuss garden plans with Trellis for Tomorrow. Thank you to Pastor Scott, Leslie Gates, Nevada Grant, Jim Gross, Nancy Gross, Sue Lowry, Marsha Staub and Nikki Young for their commitment to the garden, willingness to ask questions, and giving of time for the planning, the congregation council heard and approved the plans and a contract was signed for NHELC to partner with Trellis for Tomorrow as a Partner Site within the Food for All raised bed garden program. The dream was now officially a reality.

The planning group had much to do before the garden was actually created. They worked to announce the creation of the garden to the congregation. They also came up with an official name for the garden. It was decided to be named "The Garden of Hope", because it would not only grow produce which would be used to feed our neighbor, but it would also provide HOPE to those who are struggling. They then invited the congregation to participate in "The Garden of Hope" logo contest. They also discussed and came up with a list of "jobs" that would be required to maintain the garden. This was shared with the congregation and many individuals started offering to help. The youth were contacted and invited to participate in the Youth Springboard event offered through Trellis for Tomorrow. The planning group were busy little bees.

On Saturday afternoon, March 13th, more than 25 people came out to participate in the blessing of

the land which was to become the Garden of Hope. It was our hope that the raised beds and fence would be installed and we would be planting seeds on Maundy



Thursday, April 1st. Soil was delivered on March 26th, and installation of the garden began on March 29th. The following day the installation continued with a trench being dug from the garden to a faucet at the shed for a water irrigation system. Unfortu-

nately, weather did not cooperate and planting of the seeds was postponed to Monday, April 5th. Re-



gardless, we were blessed to have many volunteers on this day. Thank you to all who came out! As the fence was being built, volunteers raked the beds, spread mulch between the rows, and began planting seeds and seedlings. By day's end, we had planted cabbage, red cabbage, Bekana cabbage, red leaf lettuce, romain lettuce, cauliflower, collard greens, kale, Swiss chard, napa cabbage, onions, beets, potatoes, carrots, and many herbs. The Garden of Hope was alive! God's work—Our hands!

Volunteers of all ages, including our Sunday School and Camp Falckner youth, maintained the garden throughout the growing season. I'm especially thankful for Janet Smithson who volunteered a countless number of hours in the garden. The volunteers harvested produce, weeded, attempted to rid the garden of squash beetles and other unwanted bugs, and also spread additional mulch. Flowers and pollination plants were added to the beds around the perimeter of the garden. Hinterhof Farm gave us a bee hive and took care of the bees which helped to pollinate the garden.



In addition to the spring planting, we had a summer and also a fall planting. We added tomatoes,

zucchini, butternut squash, broccoli, yellow and green string beans, spinach, daikon radish, bell peppers and hot peppers to the garden. Yes, as the weather grew hot, we had a plethora of hot, hotter and even HOTTER peppers: jalapeno peppers, banana peppers, chili peppers, and habanero peppers. God provided! Overall, we harvested about 5,000 pounds of produce. Wow! God is good!

This abundance of produce was more than our food ministry could use. This abundance was shared with numerous non-profit organizations: Boyertown Multi-Service, Pottstown Cluster,

Hope Rescue Mission, Open Door Ministry, Salvation Army, Jarrett Yoder Foundation, and Trinity Food Pantry. Throughout the growing season, we shared 4,500 pounds, with our neighboring communities. What a generous way to love our neighbor.

We are looking forward to another year and seeing how God provides and helps us once again to love our neighbor. I personally was in awe as I worked in the garden. To stand in the midst of the Garden of Hope and see God at work was very humbling. The Garden of Hope fulfills the words we read in Ephesians 3:20-21 "Now to him who is able to do immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine, according to his power that is at work within us, to him be glory in the church and in Christ Jesus throughout all generations, for ever and ever!" Thanks be to God!

Constitution Committee Report

The following are some of the projects and objectives accomplished this year. There is no doubt that the curtailment of activities, due to the pandemic, through the months of 2021 and the prioritization of tasks has slowed the committee's progress.

The larger task this year and still in progress is the revision/updating of our Church Constitution and By-laws. Our current document was last revised and published in 2014. Over the past several years there have been numerous additions recommended by the ELCA. The most recent being 2019. Our current goal is to update our document to be more consistent with the ELCA recommended constitution for ELCA Churches. The activities to accomplish this goal were curtailed since March 2020 due to the pandemic.

The revised document has been presented to the Congregation Council in January 2022 for review and approval. At the January Council meeting, the revised documents of the Constitution and By-laws were reviewed. During the review several additions and deletions were noted. The document is being revised for resubmission and approval. Submission to the Southeastern PA Synod for their review and approval will follow the Congregation Council's approval to submit the document to the Synod. Once that review is completed, final revisions will be made and the document prepared for NHELC congregation approval.

This activity will continue in 2022.

The committee continues the development of a new policy structure and content of an expanded policy to guide the church in managing the NHELC Trust Fund.

The Constitution revisions project most likely will be picked up in 2022 and could take the better part of the year to prepare it for Synod review/approval and then to the congregation for approval and adoption.

The Endowment Committee and members of the Congregation Council are in the process of interviewing financial advisors to determine how they could be of benefit to help manage the Endowment Fund.

As a Continuing Resolution, the document can be revised as determined by council. The main purpose is to have something they can use going forward until such time as the Constitution is approved and adopted.


In June, after the church service on Father's Day, Flutter played Nine Square in the Air in the picnic woods with other members of the congregation.

Altar Guild Report

The purpose of the Altar Guild is to provide for the care of the altar, paraments, communion ware, baptismal ware, candles, flowers, confirmation gowns, and to decorate the worship space for special festivals in the church year. Altar flowers are delivered to hospitalized and/or homebound members after the Sunday service. The duties of the Altar Guild are vital for each worship service, and the members work closely with the pastor in preparing for all regular and special worship services plus festivals and special observances. These include Ash Wednesday, Mid-week Lenten services, Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, Easter, Blessing of the Fields, Pentecost, Harvest Home, All Saints' Sunday, Thanksgiving, Advent, and Christmas. Throughout the year, members also prepare for baptisms and funeral/memorial services when needed.

During the March 21, 2021 worship service, two fair linens, two corporals, and a communion veil were dedicated. Gift money given in honor of Ruth Wirt's 100th birthday was used to purchase one fair linen and the corporals. The second fair linen was purchased with undesignated Memorial Fund monies. Sue Lowry hand-crafted the new communion veil. Also, during the same service, old linens and paraments were retired.

Continuing from March 2020 when the Covid-19 pandemic closed churches and businesses, New Hanover Lutheran Church offered two options for worship. Pre-recorded services were posted on the website for Sunday morning viewing, and live services were held in the parking lot/picnic grove on Sunday morning at 9:00. During the first six months of 2021, the altar area continued to be prepared and decorated according to the Sundays in the Church year.
