


CAMP FALCKNER


Mowers Needed

A POINT TO PONDER


When it rains

The skeleton flower, a perennial native to Japan, has delicate petals that change from opaque white to almost transparent when wet. After it rains, only the flower's intricate, skeleton-like veins are visible.

When the rains come (and they will!) in our lives, the same can be said. Amid difficulty and struggle, our true selves often become more transparent. During a parenting challenge, criticism might emerge. Or while we tackle a tough work project, impatience might rear its ugly head.

Mental Health Month

May is Mental Health Awareness month. Topics regarding Mental Health dominate the news daily in our world. Taking care of our individual physical and emotional well-being should be part of our daily routine. Emotional wellness allows us to be our healthiest self and helps us to successfully handle any challenges life brings our way. Tips to help us achieve emotional wellness include using healthy coping strategies, reducing stress, getting quality sleep, being mindful, coping with loss, and strengthening social connections. Mindfulness is a practice receiving a great deal of attention today and is very simple to do. Practicing mindfulness helps us to focus on the present and on ourselves. Mindfulness activities that can be practiced regularly are deep breathing, being quiet listening to the sounds around us. Mindfulness is a practice I began to use regularly teaching nursing students in simulation lab to create a focal point for the experience. I began each lab with a minute of mindfulness in which students were quiet, closed their eyes and listened to their own breathing.

During the month of May, we join others to celebrate Mental Health Awareness. Pastor Scott talks weekly on the crisis we face with Mental Health. If you know someone struggling, you understand the need for support. During May, reach out to someone who may need support. All of us at one time in our lives experience life's challenges. Offer the support of yourself as a friend. Resources are available to help everyone in need. If you have not looked at our Peer Support webpage, take time to do so. Why Pronouns Matter



What's a pronoun?

Pronouns are used in place of a proper noun (like someone's name). We use pronouns most often when referring to someone without using their name.

Why does it matter?

In English, our most commonly used pronouns (he/she) specifically refer to a person's gender. For queer, gender non-conforming, non-binary, and transgender people, these pronouns may not fit, can create discomfort, and can cause stress and anxiety.

Studies have shown that in transgender youth, using correct pronouns and names reduces depression and suicide risks.

Having trouble understanding why this would upset someone? Think about your pronoun (it's probably "he" or "she"). Now imagine someone calling you the one you don't think of yourself as. Imagine them doing it over and over and over, even after you've corrected them.

Mission Service Disciple's Stories Self Esteem & Dignity Delivered

NHELC aided in the delivery of over \$750,000 of Hygiene and household goods during the past three months. What started as a \$250.00 Thrivent Action Team to deliver personal hygiene products to Veterans in need, manifested in the pickup and delivery of tons of personal hygiene, paper household goods and pull ups for all ages.

Together with the Veterans Coalition of PA (VCOP), NHELC team members distributed the much needed products that bring dignity, self esteem and most important, SMILES to many souls. The program reaches area schools, churches, homeless tent cities and family shelters.

In addition, over ten area shelters and pantries received everything from deodorant, pull ups, wipes, paper towels, and hygiene products. It didn't take much, the spark started with a Thrivent Action Team and a few conversations. Together with a major manufacturer, Chosen 300, Opportunity House, Keystone Military Families, VALOR, OLIVET (Girls & Boys Club), and our fabulous giving NHELC volunteers.

Sometimes it all starts with a simple act of generosity or conversation. I was told once, Discipleship is like one beggar telling another beggar where to get a loaf of bread. Martin Luther's last words spoken says it all, "We are all beggars, this is true." We are all beggars helping and loving our neighbors. Charles W. Naylor (1874-1950) was a traveling evangelist until misfortune struck. First a tentpole fell on him as he prepared for a meeting. A year later, a bus accident left him partially paralyzed.

Despite experiencing chronic pain, Naylor became a prolific author and hymnist, dictating almost 150 songs. He often wrote about God's loving care amid adversity. One of his hymns begins:

When the winds of persecution blow, When the streams of hatred tow'rd you flow, When your foes in number seem to grow, Just keep on shining.

"God's comfort in our times of sorrow is not an imaginary thing," Naylor wrote. "It can be so real that it is a balm for our wounded spirits. Having passed through the experience more than once, [I know] how real and vital and sustaining the comfort of God can be."
