(Sunshine Lounge): Join us to study Brant Hansen's book

Unoffendable: How Just One Change Can Make All of Life

Better. Hansen writes, "We are now living in an 'anger incubator.' That phrase is from a psychology professor at the University of California at Irvine, and I think he's right on. I imagine you agree, too. Our culture is fraught with anger. It's everywhere, and no one seems to know what to do about it. In Christian circles, we're often taught that anger can be a very good thing and that we're supposed to use our 'righteous anger' to make

things better. But here's a question: *Is that really what the Bible says about our anger?* And what are we really supposed to do about it? Are Christians supposed to be as angry as everyone else? Are we supposed to be angry about all the things in the world that we think displease God? Is our anger actually righteous? How do we know? And how long are we supposed to hold on to our anger? Or...is there another way? Yes, we live in an angry world that lacks answers and seems to spin on an axis of offense. But what if followers of Jesus were known as the most unoffendable people on the planet? Can we—and should we—become unoffendable as followers of Christ?"

We'll work together to study Hansen's ideas by reading his book, watching streaming videos, discussing what the Bible says about anger, and figuring out if we can *choose to be unoffendable*. There will be some reading to do on your own, but be assured that you are still wanted and welcome even if you don't have your "homework" done.

The Nursery room is located between the Welcome Center and the Fellowship Hall. Parents are welcome to use the room during worship as needed. A 325th Anniversary Special Presentation

“Celebrating German Lutheran Contributions in the Fight for Independence and the Young Republic”

November 9th, 2025 at 10:15 AM in the fellowship hall.



Join us for a special 325th Anniversary historical presentation on November 9th after worship in the fellowship hall. The presentation will be given by The Rev. Dr. Karl Krueger and is titled: “Celebrating German Lutheran Contributions in the Fight for Independence and the Young Republic.” Pastor Karl will also be preaching during worship.

The Rev. Dr. Karl Krueger is serving Christ Church Ithan, first in 2020 for a two-month appointment that morphed into eight months due to the COVID-19 pandemic, then returned in May 2023 as interim priest.

An ordained pastor in the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, Pastor Karl has pastored an English/German congregation in Philadelphia and a Slovak/English congregation in Windsor, Ontario. In addition, he has served as the interim rector in several congregations, including Washington Memorial Chapel in Valley Forge, and most recently as sabbatical pastor at St. Peter’s Episcopal Church in the Great Valley.

Father Karl has a Ph.D. in History from the University of Michigan and a Master’s in Library Science from Drexel University, and worked at the Balch Institute for Ethnic Studies. In addition, he directed the Krauth Memorial Library of the Lutheran Theological Seminary in Philadelphia and taught courses in church history for over fifteen years.
