Altar Linen Dedication

Two fair linens, two corporals, and a communion veil will be dedicated during the service on March 21st. One fair linen, both corporals, and the veil were acquired using gift money given in honor of Ruth Wirt’s 100th birthday. The veil was lovingly hand-crafted by church member Sue Lowry in honor of Ruth Wirt who served on the Altar Guild for fifty years. A second fair linen was purchased with undesignated Memorial Fund monies. A brief explanation of these linens is given below.

Fair Linen The fair linen is the tablecloth for the feast of the Lord. The word *fair* refers to the fine quality and cleanliness of the linen. Traditionally, five Greek crosses are embroidered in white on the fair linen – one in the center and one near each corner of the altar. The five crosses symbolize the five wounds of Christ.

Corporal The corporal, the basic cloth of the meal, is a square of linen that is laid on the center of the altar over the fair linen. It is large enough for all of the communion vessels, the bread, and the wine to be placed upon it. Its outlines delineate the food that is set out, intended for the holy supper. It is one of the most ancient altar linens used for Christian worship. The corporal is the “cloth of the body” (hence its name). A Greek cross is embroidered in white near the center front edge.

Veil The veil is a large white linen used to cover all the vessels and elements of communion.

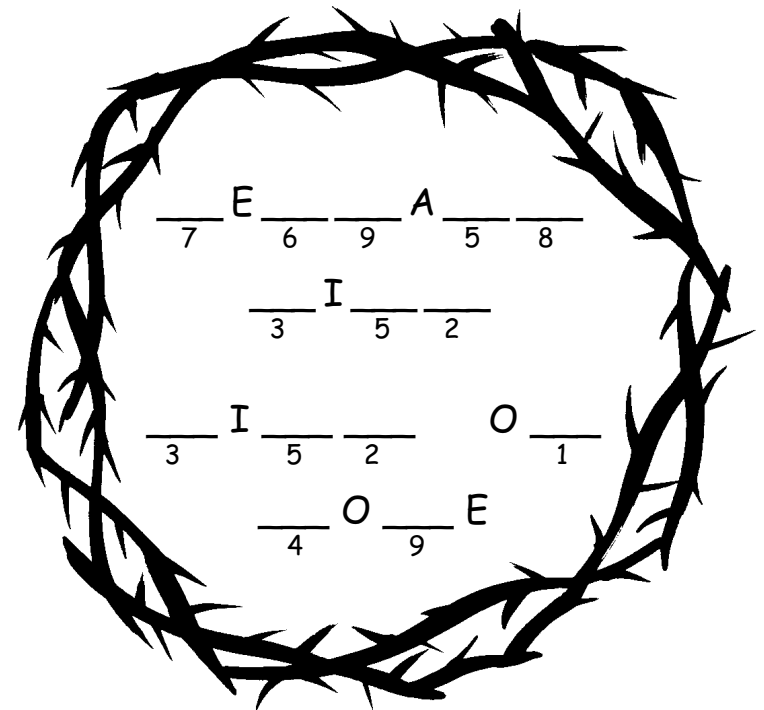
