Even in utter shock, they return to their deepest knowing and allow themselves to receive the expansiveness of resurrection. Their imaginations and hearts expand, and they must take action in response. Many of the disciples won't open themselves to this expansiveness and reject it. Peter is curious enough to return to the tomb, and as a result, he is filled with amazement and awe. How do we carry forth what we have learned this Lent? Can we be curious enough to return and remember? Can we allow ourselves to be filled with expansive hope? Can we trust in the expansive promise of new life, and carry that promise with us wherever we go?

Affirmation of Faith We believe in a God who can astound us a God who created the mountains of Colorado, the stars on a summer night, and the green of Ireland.

We believe in Jesus, whose example changes us an example of love for those on the fringes, healing for the sick, and welcome for the lonely.

We believe that Jesus was abandoned by his friends, wounded, mocked, and killed by the state.

And in a garden, three days later, we believe that life began again — the stone was rolled back, as death lost its sting.

Ever since that day, we believe the Spirit has been inviting us into an expansive life —

a life not measured by wealth or accolades, but a life full to the brim with joy, overflowing with laughter, saturated in hope, and decorated with good news.

Death has lost its sting. We believe, and are set free. Thanks be to God, amen.

Invitation to the Table – Commentary to Read Scripture tells us that on that Easter morning, the women went to the tomb and found it empty. They returned to the disciples and told them what they had heard and seen, but Peter was the only disciple to believe them. The text says, "Peter got up and ran to the tomb."

I love this detail.

I can picture it; can't you? Peter running to that garden. Peter praying, with every step, *let it be true, let it be true.* Peter out of breath, desperately hoping he'll see Jesus again around every corner.

Friends, sometimes that's how I come to this Table—praying with every step, running to get here, desperate to feel something holy, praying I'll see Jesus around every corner. Other times, my spirit is still and I find myself slowly and calmly returning to this Table.

No matter how you feel today—whether you're running to get here, whether you are desperate and hungry for a spiritual experience, or whether you are unsure and moving slowly—know that there is room for you here.

This Table is an expansive Table. There is food for everyone. There is a seat for everyone. There is love for everyone. There is no scarcity here, because this is God's Table, so all are welcome.

It's good enough news you might even want to run.

Great Prayer of Thanksgiving God of the garden, God of new life, God of the here and now,

where do we begin?

Our hearts are full to the brim with gratitude, hope, fear, doubt, dreams, and belief. As a result, our prayers can often feel chaotic at best, bouncing around to each name and need that comes to mind.

Settle us.

Excavate us.

Summon out what we shall be.

Lift our prayers from the rubble of our distracted minds and hold us close.

God, there are some things we would like to let go of, things we'd like to bury, things that we do not want to bring with us into this new day.

In particular, we'd like to let go of our stress and fatigue.

We'd like to let go of our own self-criticism and low self-esteem. We'd like to let go of the fear to put ourselves out there, and the worry that we might not have enough or be enough.

These things are always easier said than done, God, which is why we need you.

At the same time, there are things we'd like to hold close—things that draw us closer to that expansive life you dream for us, things we are running toward. In particular, we want to move closer to balance and to meaningful friendships, to health of mind, body, and spirit, to justice that sets our hearts on fire, and to your Word—lived out in our daily lives.

Help us. Guide the way. Meet us in the garden.

Roll back the stones that stop us. Give us the energy to run toward you. Gather us up into your expansive love.

Until the promised day when swords are beaten into plowshares, and the prayers of the people are only prayers of joy, we ask that you pour out your Spirit on this bread and cup so that we might catch a glimpse of you here at this Table. Gather us up into your expansive love.

Until that promised day, we will continue to pray.

Together we pray:

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread; and forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us; and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, forever and ever. Amen.

Words of Institution

In the night in which he was betrayed, our Lord Jesus took bread, and gave thanks; broke it, and gave it to his disciples, saying: Take and eat; this is my body, given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me. Again, after supper, he took the cup, gave thanks, and gave it for all to drink, saying: This cup is the new covenant in my blood, shed for you and for all people for the forgiveness of sin. Do this for the remembrance of me.

Today we celebrate Holy Communion. This is the Lord's Table, open to everyone.

The body of Christ, given for you. Take and eat. (*The response is "Amen", then eat the bread*).

The blood of Christ, shed for you. Take and drink. (*The response is, "Amen", then drink the cup*).

We give you thanks, generous God, for in this bread and cup we have tasted the new heaven and earth where hunger and thirst are no more. Send us from this table as witnesses to the resurrection, that through our lives, all may know life in Jesus' name. **Amen.**
