
Welcome to worship at New Hanover Evangelical Lutheran Church

⁴⁵If David thus calls him Lord, how can he be his son?" ⁴⁶No one was able to give him an answer, nor from that day did anyone dare to ask him any more questions.

Food Ministry

Turkeys are needed for Thanksgiving meals prepared by the Loaves & Fishes Food Ministry.

The Food Ministry continues to grow, serving on average 812 meals per week to our neighbors in need. Because of this growth we are identifying ways to expand our kitchen and food distribution capabilities, increase the size of our garden, building relationships with other organizations with similar missions and considering adding a position to assist with the day-to-day logistics. Below are some of the Food Ministry tasks and tasks where we need more help.

- 1. **Recording meeting minutes** (2nd Wednesday each month): About 2.5 hours per month. This person would NOT need to be part of the committee.
- 2. **Searching and applying for Grants**: Computer skills and some perseverance will be required. Time commitment varies.
- 3. **Logistics** (multiple opportunities): Assist with day-to-day food acquisition, kitchen maintenance coordination, tracking expenses, and more, 8 10 hours per week.
- 4. **Volunteer coordination**: Assist with the scheduling of volunteers and tasks. Time commitments:
 - a. Garden: varies by season (see #6)
 - b. **Kitchen**: 1-2 hours per week
- 5. **Volunteer time for food preparation** (assist Chef Chris): 4 6 hours per week.
- 6. **Volunteer time in the garden** (seasonal garden prep, planting, watering, weeding, harvesting, prep for winter): Provide whatever time you can.
- 7. Volunteer for food delivery: About 1 hour per week.
- 8. Join our vibrant committee and help lead our growth and direction: Time commitment varies based on role and assigned tasks. Two hours minimum for monthly meeting.



John 8:31-36


Martin Luther was a teacher who wanted everyone to know about the Bible. The printing press was just invented. Martin Luther used it to print copies of his translation of the Bible into the language the people spoke everyday. He

parents to teach their children about God. He wrote a study

book to help families learn together.

Luther's Small Catechism is still used today.
