Leonard Cohen's hauntingly beautiful melody "Hallelujah" was written in the early 1980s. As it became more popular in the 1990s, Christian song writers were inspired to write new lyrics appropriate for Christmas, Easter, and general use. The chorus, repeated after each verse, is a simple but powerful "Hallelujah." This word, a Hebrew expression, means "praise be to God." The general use lyrics tell of God's love for humankind, that God sent God's firstborn son to pay a price we couldn't pay, and the hope that all will come to know the Savior, our sins satisfied and our hearts renewed. Hallelujah!
