Thanksgiving 1863 Then & Now, any difference? You be the judge

President Lincoln in 1863 made a proclamation to observe thanksgiving as a Nation, crippled by a civil war perpetrated by hatred, to observe and dine with others in peace. Today in 2021, our Nation and community is threatened by hatred once again that possibly will thrust us into a divided state. However; as was then as is now, it is a time to remind ourselves of the unity we "all" have as one nation under God, Christians and "all" being children of God.

Lincoln appeals to the nation then and his words resound today with the message, "It has seemed to me fit and proper that they should be solemnly, reverently and gratefully acknowledged as with one heart and one voice by the whole American People." As was then, we have recently brought home soldiers from afar from conflict and war.

While there may be strife and divided communities abroad; it is my hope that we, who tend to be called upon as a presence of peace in other nations, may find a way to find with one heart and one voice by the whole American People in our homes and community to find peace. Let us embrace the words written in 1863 to inspire us all to truly thank God for all our blessings this year and years to come.

This Thanksgiving, may we all place our politics, our ambitions, and differences aside to truly gather and thank God. Peace and prayers of thanksgiving for your presence and service unto our Lord.

President Lincoln's Proclamation for the Recognition of Thanksgiving

Washington, D.C. October 3, 1863

By the President of the United States of America.

A Proclamation.

The year that is drawing towards its close, has been filled with the blessings of fruitful fields and healthful skies. To these bounties, which are so constantly enjoyed that we are prone to forget the source from which they come, others have been added, which are of so extraordinary a nature, that they cannot fail to penetrate and soften even the heart which is habitually insensible to the ever watchful providence of Almighty God. In the midst of a civil war of unequalled magnitude and severity, which has sometimes seemed to foreign States to invite and to provoke their aggression, peace has been preserved with all nations, order has been maintained, the laws have been respected and obeyed, and harmony has prevailed everywhere except in the theatre of military conflict; while that theatre has been greatly contracted by the advancing armies and navies of the Union.

Needful diversions of wealth and of strength from the fields of peaceful industry to the national defense, have not arrested the plough, the shuttle or the ship; the axe has enlarged the borders of our settlements, and the mines, as well of iron and coal as of the precious metals, have yielded even more abundantly than heretofore. Population has steadily increased, notwithstanding the waste that has been made in the camp, the siege and the battlefield; and the country, rejoicing in the consciousness of augmented strength and vigor, is permitted to expect continuance of years with large increase of freedom.

No human counsel hath devised nor hath any mortal hand worked out these great things. They are the gracious gifts of the Most High God, who, while dealing with us in anger for our sins, hath nevertheless remembered mercy. It has seemed to me fit and proper that they should be solemnly, reverently and gratefully acknowledged as with one heart and one voice by the whole American People.

I do therefore invite my fellow citizens in every part of the United States, and also those who are at sea and those who are sojourning in foreign lands, to set apart and observe the last Thursday of November next, as a day of Thanksgiving and Praise to our beneficent Father who dwelleth in the Heavens. And I recommend to them that while offering up the ascriptions justly due to Him for such singular deliverances and blessings, they do also, with humble penitence for our national perverseness and disobedience, commend to His tender care all those who have become widows, orphans, mourners or sufferers in the lamentable civil strife in which we are unavoidably engaged, and fervently implore the interposition of the Almighty Hand to heal the wounds of the nation and to restore it as soon as may be consistent with the Divine purposes to the full enjoyment of peace, harmony, tranquility and Union.

In testimony whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Seal of the United States to be affixed.

Done at the City of Washington, this Third day of October, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, and of the Independence of the United States the Eighty-eighth.


Vision Statement

NHELC Scouting Ministry Turns 70!

Seventy years ago, on September 30, 1951, New Hanover Lutheran Church was granted its initial charter from the Boy Scouts of America to operate the Cub Scout Program for boys in elementary school. A year later, the Scout Troop was formed to accommodate older Scouts. Since then, much has changed, but one thing is for certain: SCOUTING IS FLOURISHING in New Hanover. Today, NHELC holds the charter of three Scouting Units: Cub Scout Pack 367 with more than 60 boys and girls in kindergarten through fifth grade and two Scouts BSA Troops, one for boys and one for girls. Troops are for Scouts who are in sixth through twelfth grades. The Scouting program has specific objectives, commonly referred to as the "Aims of Scouting." They are character development, leadership development, citizenship training, and personal fitness. Leadership development is also one of Scouting's eight methods contributing to both good character and good citizenship.

All three Scouting units are currently meeting weekly, primarily inside using Fellowship Hall and the Sunday School classrooms. Cub Scout Pack 367 meets weekly on Mondays from 7:00-8:00. Troop 367B (with more than 40 Scouts) and Troop 367G (currently with 7 Scouts) meet weekly on Tuesdays from 6:30-8:15, primarily in Fellowship Hall. Activities of all three units are numerous, including working on requirements towards rank advancements, merit badges, and other awards.



Of course, you can't take the *outing* out of Sc*outing*. Camping, service and conservation projects, hiking, biking, boating, nature appreciation, sports, and many other activities help the Scouts to develop a love of the outdoors in our Scouts. The Cub Scouts and their families (more than 60 campers!) spent a weekend in October camping at Evansburg State Park. The Troops enjoyed their September camping trip at Camp Delmont in Pennsburg, where they competed in a cardboard canoe race in which the canoes were made by the Scout Patrols with only cardboard, glue, duct tape, and paint. This was the first race of this kind for these Scouts, and let's just say the Scouts learned a lot that weekend (and the adults were thoroughly entertained).

This summer, the Scouts participated in events including whitewater rafting, an Iron Pigs baseball game, camping at Fort Mifflin in Philadelphia, summer camp, and a pool party. One group of nine older Scouts and three adults from Troop 367G spent two weeks on a trip of a lifetime hiking more than 120 miles at a special Scout Ranch called Philmont in Cimarron, New Mexico. More than two years of training were required by the crew to prepare for this trip, and they all say it was worth every moment to have such memories to cherish for the rest of their lives, despite wading through rivers, and in the rain and thunderstorms and even being hailed on three separate times!

The Scouts and their families and the registered adult leaders are very grateful to the Congregation of New Hanover Lutheran Church for sponsoring our Scouting units and for providing such wonderful facilities for us to use as our Scouting home base.
