We provide free, voluntary services for people wishing to build natural supports, discover new activities, use mutuality to locate resources while walking beside peers as we become stronger and better versions of ourselves.

Upcoming activities

Current peers are planning activities in art, baking, electronics and creative writing. We aim to nurture peer to peer support naturally while doing creative activities. Because some peers have expressed interest, we also hope to offer volunteer opportunities in the Garden of Hope.

Because our peers find a flexible schedule helpful in their recovery, we are continuing personal one-to-one support and casual peer-to-peer meetups.

We look forward to great success in empowering our recovery community and helping them become independent and full of hope while pursuing goals they believe are important to them.

We thank the members at NHELC for supporting this program. Together we are helping people rebuild their lives with the help of people who "get it." We are also helping our church and the community at large to erase some of the stigma related to addiction and mental health issues.

Youth Retreats and Opportunities

Box City -Grades 6-12 -March 11-12th

Box City 2023 is coming back (after a Covid Hiatus). This will be at St. James in Limerick with other youth from our Synod. This event raises awareness about homelessness and is a lock in type event. During the event, youth will hear real-life stories about homelessness, discuss and learn about this social issue in fun ways, and experience what it's like sleeping without proper shelter. Tuscarora Youth Retreat -Grades 6-12 -March 24 - 26 -

This is a weekend long retreat with other synod youth, but is a Lutheran retreat. The theme is "Do Justice, Show Love, Walk Humbly With God" The cost is \$125 if we register by January 29th. Summer Camp Opportunities

Camp Falckner - This is our retreat for youth that have completed 5th grade - 12th grade. It is at the Grove and most campers camp out in tents. It's not required and if you work or have various sports you are permitted to come and go as needed. Camp will be July 25 - 28.

Bear Creek Camp - Bear Creek Camp's overnight camping program, for all children who have completed grades 1-12, is a traditional camp program centered on spiritual growth, outdoor living and small group development. Each age group experiences a mix of small-group and all-camp activities throughout their week to meet their group's spiritual, social and developmental needs. Hope found in an Easter Egg Hunt

Hope can be found in a favorite
Bible verse, uplifting ballad or in a
fantastic display or courage by your
favorite athlete. We have been talking
about the concept of having hope in Christ
a lot during Advent and Christmas, and
hope is a central theme during Lent and
Easter as well. However, Hope can be found
in some of the most peculiar places, even in
an Easter Egg Hunt.

Each year, my wife Marsha and I sponsor an Easter Egg hunt at our home. The hunt includes all ages. There is of course a head start for the younger children and the adults (the older children) are then given the go ahead to search and compete. That is the only rule, there are not others, and do they ever compete!

My Brother-in-law Felix also started a tradition within the Easter Egg Hunt. After everyone gathered their eggs and were ripping through to find their prizes, he would proudly and quietly sit on the front porch, slowly open his egg so all could see and pull out a \$50.00 bill from one of the eggs. Marsha and I, nor Felix shared with the others that Felix stuffed his own egg (remember there are no rules), and there was no \$50.00 prize ever. Year after year, Felix always found the golden goose's egg so to speak; however, hope prevailed in the others.

With the unfortunate passing of Felix several years ago, Marsha and I decided to introduce the \$50.00 prize in honor of Felix and bring back the hope. The amazement on the face of the grandchild who found the prize was unforgettable, and as it was the tradition, everyone else feverously opened their eggs to see if they too had a generous prize. There was only one big prize; however, there were many other generous prizes as well, and everyone made out well, and hope prevailed.

At the end of the hunt, there is always talk about the big prize winner; however, there is much more talk about the competition, the bumps and scrapes, and the hope for next year. Easter has a way of doing that. The resurrection and promise of eternal life have us all in hope. Hope, shared in the stories we tell our children, family and friends of the day when we all will be rejoicing with our Lord. Like, in last years Easter Egg Hunt, the big prize of life in Christ is real today. However, with God's promise, we will all sit, and be amazed that God provides us all with the big prize of eternal salvation.
