- ◆ The Council and Food Ministry Board express a big "Thank You" to Jim Davidheiser for his temporary chef responsibilities for our Loaves & Fishes Food Ministry while Chef Chris Fatzinger was on medical leave for six weeks recovering from recent surgery. Welcome back Chef Chris!
- The Council wishes the staff and the entire NHELC membership a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year!
- ◆ Please plan to attend the December 10th Congregation Meeting for presentation of the 2024 Annual Budget and the first ratification vote of the NHELC Constitution updates (two separate Congregational meetings required to fully ratify Constitution).
- Council nominations are open! Please see any current Council member if you have any interest in supporting the business side of NHELC and joining the Council.
- The Council voted favorably to allow Pastor Scott to take up to five weeks of un-paid sabbatical time annually, not to be used all at the same time, and revisited annually. This is within the acceptable ELCA guidelines for full-time rostered leaders.
- Projected 2024 budget anticipated deficit could be erased if each giving unit increased giving by \$75.00/month.

Mental Health Wellness: Coping Over the Holidays

The holiday season is a joyous time of the year filled with families, friends and activities. For some people though, the holiday season brings on stress, sadness and depression brought on by many situations. There are useful tips people can do to help minimize the stress and sadness and ways to help others who may be in need this holiday season.

The holidays are a happy time so why do I feel so down? Stress leads to sadness and depression. Stress over family, gifts, loved ones far away and loved ones lost leads to an empty feeling. This stress and sadness brings on a range of emotions for people.

Some ways to cope with the above include:

- ✓ Maintain a well-balanced nutrition plan. A good diet promotes a positive feeling of self.
- ✓ Get regular exercise to improve mood and energy levels. Go outside even on a cold day and get some much-needed vitamin C.
- ✓ Maintain a healthy sleep pattern. Lack of sleep affects your mood, how you think, and overall functioning. Seven to nine hours per day is recommended but everyone is different. Most important is to be consistent.

- ✓ Make time for family and friends. They are a good support system.
- ✓ Do a random act of kindness such as volunteering or donating to a charity. Activities like this increase self-esteem. Reach out to someone in need with a call or visit or send a card to someone.

Feeling down at times is normal for individuals, especially during difficult times. Persistent or ongoing sadness and depression may indicate something deeper. Winter brings cold weather and darkness which can affect the mental state of people. Check out resources on the websites for mental health such as NAMI and the Centers for Disease Control (CDC).

Grief and loss is difficult for those with recent loss. My family and I are one of many families facing this situation this holiday season with the loss of someone very dear. Reach out to others and let them know you care. It is truly a random act of kindness.

Reconciling in Christ (RIC)

Frequently Asked Questions

What do we have to do to become an RIC church?

There are four principal steps to achieving RIC status within the ELCA. They are:

- Our church explicitly states a welcome to people of "all sexual orientations, gender identities, and gender expressions" or "LGBTQIA+" and names our commitment to racial equity or anti-racism in our Welcome Statement
- 2. Be open to calling an LGBTQIA+ and Black, Brown, Indigenous, Person of Color (BIPOC) rostered leader
- 3. Allow LGBTQIA+ weddings and blessings to be performed in our sanctuary
- 4. Make a "meaningful" annual contribution to support the national RIC program

What does this process look like?

Most RIC processes take 1-2 years. During that time there will be:

- One-to-one conversations between the RIC Core Team and congregation members
- Bible studies
- Video discussions
- Open forums

We can then earn the RIC designation when we approve the new Welcome Statement through a congregational vote.

What is a "Welcome Statement?"

A community's Welcome Statement is a public document created to specifically welcome "lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer, intersex, and asexual/aromantic" (LGBTQIA+) people or "people of all sexual orientations, gender identities, and gender expressions" and a "commitment to racial equity" or "anti-racism."

Why single out LGBTQIA+ folks and a commitment to anti-racism? Aren't we already welcoming?

Earning and displaying the RIC designation helps remove the guesswork for those seeking a safe and welcoming congregation. When an LGBTQIA+ Christian enters an RIC church they will know that they are welcome to be themselves and to fully participate in the life of the church.

That is not always the case in many churches. LGBTQIA+ people either assume they are not truly welcome or that they have to take a risk to see if the congregation they visit will let them truly be a part of the church and still be themselves.

When was the RIC program started and why?

Since 1983, the RIC program has been a public way for faith communities to see, name, celebrate, and advocate for people of all sexual orientations, gender identities, and gender expressions in the Lutheran church.

What impact will this have on church attendance?

Becoming RIC is not a silver bullet to improve attendance or finances. Many congregations do see growth after becoming RIC, but that is not why we would consider doing it. If we want to become RIC, we should do so because we believe it is what God is calling us to do.

What happens after we become RIC?

We would be added to the ReconcilingWorks list of RIC congregations. People can go to the ReconcilingWorks website to look for RIC congregations in our area and we will show up when folks search for local churches. We can advertise ourselves as a faith community that has done this discernment work and is affirming to LGBTQIA+ people. This might practically look like putting the RIC logo on our signs, in our bulletins, our newsletter, website, etc. We can also publish our Welcome Statement in the bulletin or on the website, etc.

Who can I talk to if I want to learn more or share some thoughts?

The NHELC RIC Core Team is responsible for setting the schedule of educational opportunities and drafting the Welcome Statement that will be presented to the church council for approval. Then, in turn, the Welcome Statement will be presented to the congregation for approval.

The members of this team are Pastor Scott, Diane Bealer, Rick Hausch, Sharon Tracey, Josh Young, and Janet Psota. Please feel welcome to approach any of these Core Team members with questions or concerns.

How many ELCA organizations are RIC?

Currently, approximately 9% of ELCA organizations and ministries are recognized as RIC. This number includes congregations, seminaries, synods, campus ministries, etc. At the time of this writing there are 1031 RIC organizations and 303 organizations in the process of becoming RIC.

What is the relationship between ReconcilingWorks, the ELCA?

ReconcilingWorks is an independently organized 501(c)(3) organization. The Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) formally recognizes ReconcilingWorks as an "Independent Lutheran Organization," affirming collaborative work in reaching out to lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer, intersex, and asexual/aromantic people. ReconcilingWorks advocates for change within the institutional churches to ensure that all rites, sacraments, and ministries of the Church are open to all.
